

Fully Relying on God

s a requirement of my job, I need to get my commercial driver's license. As I write this, I have completed the truck driver's school, but have not yet taken the MVA exam.

Learning how to drive a tractor-trailer has been very challenging and stressful for me. It is one thing to motor around in my relatively small car with its automatic transmission; it is quite another to safely drive a 50-plus foot long tractor-trailer. The truck is much wider than my car, and it has an 8 speed manual transmission, which requires double-clutching to keep from grinding the gears. There is much less margin for error. I have gained much greater respect for those who drive the big rigs for a living.

Going to the school has been one huge Piety walk. I believe God had two purposes in mind: The first was to get me to fully rely on Him and not on my own strength or understanding, and the second was to allow the instructors and other students to see me doing that. I expect there are other purposes that will be revealed in due time.

Going to the school was also another opportunity to let the Light of Christ shine through me. I wore a Christian ball cap every day, which I believe can be an effective yet gentle invitation to ask questions and engage in conversation. Those conversations occurred, and some seeds were planted.

There are three parts to the MVA exam: The pre-trip inspection, the skills test, and the road test. The pre-trip inspection is a list of 105 things, recalled from memory, that need to be inspected prior to driving the vehicle.

The skills test consists of 4 maneuvers on a test course: backing in a straight line for 100 feet, parallel parking on both the driver's side and passenger side, and backing into a simulated alley dock.

The road test is a 30-40 minute drive on public

roads. There are a number of things which are easy to do - for example, rolling backwards when stopped - and that will cause immediate failure.

I had the most trouble with driving on the public roads. My instructor was very good; he was a patient and effective trainer, but all the small details that need to be watched really ramped up my anxiety and stress levels. I wasn't sleeping well, and I approached each day with dread.

I knew I could not learn to drive the truck using my own strength, and that I needed to fully rely on God. I prayed often for God to be with all of us at the school, to watch over us, to protect us, to grant us the peace that passeth all understanding, to guide our hands, feet, mind, heart and soul, and to glorify His Holy Name in all of it. I also asked other people to pray. These prayers were powerful and effective. Even so, I still wasn't sleeping well, and I approached each school day with dread.

It was when I woke up on the last day of school that I realized I hadn't prayed for one very important thing – for God to increase my desire! That's why, even though I was relying on God to get me through, I was dreading going to school every day! Duh! So, I did pray for God to increase my desire, and that last day was my best one. I was much less anxious about driving the truck, we had a nice run out to Frederick and back, and now I am much less worried about the outcome of the MVA exam.

I am sure I have more to learn about fully relying on God. Even so, what I have learned has stayed with me. Recently at work, I had to go up about 80 feet in a bucket truck to work on a crane. Normally, I would be really nervous about that (going up in a bucket truck is much different than walking around on top of a crane), but I asked God to watch over me and give me peace, and He did. I pray that He will always remind me to fully rely on Him.

Dear fellow Cursillistas,

Times are difficult for many of us. Some folks have lost their job. Retirement savings accounts have collapsed. Investment income has been reduced. So for many we may not be as flexible with our charitable giving as in the past – we all appreciate that. But the work of sharing the Gospel of Jesus never ends, and Maryland Episcopal Cursillo continues in its mission, continues to offer three-day Weekends, publishes *The Abrazo*, maintains an active prayer ministry on the internet, and serves the people of the Diocese of Maryland. If you are able to assist in that ministry by means of a financial contribution, many thanks!

In 2008 the Secretariat of Maryland Episcopal Cursillo initiated a pledge program, asking Cursillistas to pledge \$100 per annum – or such amount as they might afford – toward the program and mission of MEC, and Maryland Cursillo responded generously, giving more than \$4000. As a result, we were able to expand our programs and support our mission with the increased financial support from the community.

We again appeal to the Cursillo Community to continue its financial support. MEC 2009 Pledge Program

The Way of the Cross (WOC) - Manresa-On-The-Severn

guess I am a slow learner, but after 10 years of chairing the Way of The Cross (WOC) Ecumenical Service on Good Friday at Manresa-On-The-Severn, Annapolis, I realized something that should have been obvious.

I was asked why the old, vine covered, unused, stone formations used by the Jesuits (Retreat Home since 1926) were now the focus of spirit-filled Christians who have been worshipping there for 10 years. As I thought about the answer to this question, the names Dave Mallery, Ann Wheeler, Margie Mack, Bernie Winthrop, Nancy White, Mary Glasspool+, Angela Shepherd+, Dave and Claudia Frantz, Eileen House+, and many others came to mind. I remembered that on a Cursillo weekend (MD 76, or when I was a team member a few years later), I experienced the Stations of the Cross at Claggett. Seeing the stone formations while working as an activities guy for the assisted living center, now Atria Manresa, I envisioned the potential for a Stations of the Cross on this beautiful site on the Severn.

In late 1999, Mary Glasspool+, Angela Shepherd+ and I donned our combat boots and walked around the site to scope out the stone formations. To further confirm our thoughts about the site's potential, we obtained a pictorial history Manresa o f the site from Jesuit friends now located at their present retreat site on the Potomac River. Thanks to the above named Cursillistas and many others, the rest is history. Today, five Roman Catholic, a Lutheran, a Baptist, a United Methodist and five Episcopal churches, along with two Kiwanis Clubs, form the WOC team.

A Statement from the National Episcopal Cursillo Committee

Cursillo has always kept its eyes firmly focused on Jesus and on the Mission. One of the principles of the Cursillo movement is that:

We focus on Christ and His resurrection power in our lives, transforming us into the people He would have us be. Theological disputes and political issues have no part in our agenda.

The Cursillo Movement is a movement that brings together all people, whether they might consider themselves to have a liberal or conservative Christian philosophy or somewhere in between, for the common good of promoting Jesus Christ and God's Mission. It is Christ-centered and Christ-focused. The Policy of the National Episcopal Cursillo Committee is that it will not be an organization with a political or social agenda. National Episcopal Cursillo is a movement of the Episcopal Church.

We recognize, however, that a number of individuals with connections and interest in the Episcopal Cursillo Movement are no longer affiliated with the Episcopal Church. As a sign of reconciliation, we welcome those still able, as individuals, to be in communion with the local Episcopal Diocesan Bishop and fellow Cursillistas, whether lay or ordained, to participate in the activities of the Cursillo Movement. Furthermore, and always at the Diocesan Bishop's discretion, we encourage an openness to their continued participation and interest in the activities of the Episcopal Cursillo. It should be understood by all that as a part of their participation, they agree to do so fully for the advancement of Cursillo, be supportive of the mission of Episcopal Cursillo, and agree that they will not promote any political agenda.

What is clear is that National Episcopal Cursillo was created to serve the Episcopal Church in the United States, and we are licensed by the Roman Catholic Church to do that. Despite our personal theological and political views, we are focused on knowing Christ and making Him known to others. That is our call and in doing it lays our greatest joy. Ultreya! Ultreya!!

Let us get on with the day's apostolic action.

Let us all pray for the Church and one another every day.
